
MOVING OUR REGION. TOGETHER.

LinkUS seeks to provide a complete mobility system along key regional corridors, including high capacity and advanced rapid transit, technology solutions, bicycle and pedestrian improvements, and land use changes. The initiative is a response to the challenges facing a growing region, including managing traffic congestion, ensuring equitable access to jobs and housing, promoting economic vitality, and improved sustainability. It builds on numerous previous regional planning efforts, including COTA's NextGen vision and the MORPC insight2050 Corridor Concepts study.

Phase 1 outcomes:

- Identified the preferred bus rapid transit (BRT) alignment from Downtown Columbus to the Bethel Road area
- Generated an Active Transportation Connectivity Plan
- Created the transit-supportive development principles to guide the project going forward
- Developed a guiding plan for Phase 2 work


What we heard:

- More than 80% of survey respondents were supportive of a modern rapid transit choice
- Reliability and travel time are important
- Route connections to neighborhoods are key
- Sustainable infrastructure should be prioritized

A WORLD-CLASS CITY DESERVES WORLD-CLASS TRANSIT

Purpose

Provide premier and affordable transit service to meet the existing and long-term regional mobility and local access needs for residents, businesses and institutions within the project area.

Needs



Provide equitable access to jobs and opportunities

- 30% of all Franklin County jobs are served by the Northwest corridor
- About 35% of trips from no-car households in Franklin County are within, into or out of the corridor



Prioritize transit movement to ensure reliable and efficient travel time

Approximately 27% of all transit trips in Franklin County are within, into, or out
of, the corridor



Provide frequent transit options for regional and local trips

- 3 of the top 5 largest employers in Central Ohio are located within or very near the Northwest Corridor
- 60,000 students are enrolled at OSU
- 60% of all trips to OSU originate in the corridor



Provide a high-quality transit supportive environment to create an attractive alternative to driving

- 30% of Olentangy River Road has no sidewalk or trail on either side
- Of the existing bus stops, only 5% have benches, 8% have shelters and 39% have lighting



Align with Vision Zero goals and use multimodal design to prioritize the safety of all corridor users

- Project will be designed to promote safety for all users
- Active transportation connections will be improved throughout the corridor
